The Avon and Somerset Bleed Kit Partnership launched a brand-new knife crime education scenario at the Bristol Lifeskills centre last month.

As Year 6 pupils get ready for their significant transition into secondary school, this unique interactive scenario will teach them about the risks associated with carrying a knife. During the scenario, pupils are encouraged to consider their own reactions to various scenarios and determine the safest course of action in each one. Additionally, they learn where and how to get help if they have concerns about knife crime or an individual's behaviour.

Last year, Avon and Somerset Police, Avon Metals and Lifeskills came together a creative partnership to fund this unique intervention. More than 1,000 knives and bladed weapons are surrendered into the Avon and Somerset Police Surrender Bins each month. In 2024, the collection was safely transported to Avon Metals in Gloucester, where they were melted down to form alloy ingots. Avon Metals then sold these alloy ingots commercially and committed £10,000 in funding (obtained through the surrender bin initiative) to enable the scenario to be delivered for a year.

The Police and Crime Commissioner's Crime Prevention Fund, in collaboration with the Quartet Community Foundation, which is dedicated to helping communities become safer, awarded a £5,000 grant, which helped bring this knife crime scenario to life.

This collaboration has proactively repurposed and utilised surrendered weapons to benefit and empower young people in making informed decisions about knife crime.

Our partnership with Avon Metals and Lifeskills demonstrates how we can repurpose something harmful and turn it into a potentially life-saving resource. If this intervention protects just one child from the dangers of knife crime, it has made our efforts worthwhile.

STRENGTHENING AWARENESS & ENGAGEMENT

This year, our ASVRP Hub team will be actively visiting and engaging with various interventions across Avon and Somerset. By connecting in person, we aim to enhance awareness of the ongoing initiatives within the Violence Reduction Partnership (VRP) and help spread their impact more widely.

BLUNT TRUTH: A LIFE-SAVING INITIATIVE



Blunt Truth is a powerful collaboration, curated by Avon and Somerset Police in Bristol. In North Somerset, the VRP, Police, Army Reserves and Avon Fire are delivering vital workshops to pupils in school year 9.

The interactive session includes an engaging Bristol made film, open discussions, and hands-on first-aid training.

The initiative educates young people on the dangers of knife crime, the importance of reporting concerns, and how to provide emergency first aid if needed.



By fostering awareness and responsibility, Blunt Truth empowers students to make the right choices and contribute to a safer community.

Blunt Truth is also delivered across South Gloucestershire and Bristol through Avon and Somerset Police and supported by the Great Western Air Ambulance Charity.

EMPOWERING YOUNG PEOPLE THROUGH BYSTANDER TRAINING

Somerset VRP has partnered with Collaborate Digital to deliver a series of engaging workshops across secondary schools in the region. These workshops, focus on critical thinking, creativity, and teamwork, and are designed to empower students with the skills they need to tackle important social issues.

A key highlight is the Bystander Training initiative, which is educating students on how to safely challenge harmful behaviours like bullying and incivility. By equipping young people with the knowledge to intervene effectively, the program fosters safer and more inclusive environments in schools and communities.

In an age where the role of an active bystander is more crucial than ever, this training empowers students to make a positive impact, whether online or in their local communities.

HOSPITAL NAVIGATOR PROJECT SUPPORTS YOUNG PEOPLE AT RISK

Somerset Violence Reduction Partnership and Somerset Drug and Alcohol Partnership jointly funded an innovative hospital navigator project called Admit. This initiative is designed to provide timely intervention and support to young individuals at risk due to violence, exploitation, or substance misuse.

Through Admit, Turning Point Services places experienced project staff in the Accident & Emergency (A&E) departments at both Musgrove Park Hospital and Yeovil General Hospital during peak hours.



These dedicated professionals bring a wealth of experience in working with young people and will be on hand to offer immediate guidance and support when it is needed most. So far, from April to December 2024, Admit has engaged with **48 young people, 40 individuals** over **25**, and **13 professionals.**

This collaborative effort between key agencies highlights Somerset's commitment to tackling youth vulnerability proactively. By embedding support services within hospital settings, the project aims to create a safer future for young people in our communities.

SPORTS MENTORING

Somerset VRP funded a sports mentoring initiative in partnership with Jump Start, which is more than just a sports programme — providing a safe and supportive space where young people feel valued, heard, and empowered. Their mentors work closely with identified young people, integrating them into community activities and helping them better understand the impact of their behaviours. By offering consistency and positive role models, they create an environment where young people can develop essential life skills and self-awareness.



From April to December 2024, Jump Start worked with 26 young people and 9 professionals, providing crucial support and mentorship. These numbers reflect their commitment to making a real difference in the lives of young people who need it most.



B&NES VRP hosted their fourth annual professionals conference last month. This years theme was 'Exploitation and Youth Violence'. PCC, Clare Moody, opened the day.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER:

Craig Pinkney, CEO of Solve, explored the national landscape of exploitation, delving into the multifaceted ways it impacts children and young people. He challenged attendees to broaden their understanding beyond drug-related exploitation, examining the influence of gangs and extremist groups.

- Betsy de Thierry, MA, Consultant Psychotherapist, Trainer, Author, CEO of <u>Trauma Recovery Global</u> covered 'The Cycle of the Impact of Trauma'.
- Sophia McKenzie, <u>B&NES VRP</u>Co-ordinator reflected on day.

The conference provided valuable insight from the speakers and encouraged attendees to examine how they could collaborate to safeguard young people from violence and exploitation.

I'm aware prevention work doesn't always make the headlines, but I firmly believe early intervention, trauma-informed approaches, and community support are essential for long-term change. That is why I've made reducing serious youth violence part of one of the five main priorities in my <u>Police and Crime Plan.</u>

TACKLING KNIFE CRIME: PARENTAL AWARENESS EVENTS

Late last year, the B&NES VRP hosted five 'Parental Knife Crime Awareness Events' to address growing concerns about knife crime. The sessions aimed to equip parents with knowledge and strategies to protect young people. Expert speakers from law enforcement, youth services, and community organizations shared insights on risks, warning signs, and ways to talk to children about safety. Parents received practical advice on engaging with their children and finding additional support. The initiative was well-received, empowering parents and fostering a community dialogue to prevent youth involvement in knife crime.

EMPIRE FIGHTING CHANCE

South Gloucestershire VRP funded the sports organisation Empire Fighting Chance to teach young people how to participate in non-contact boxing, which developed their communication and time keeping skills. Young people are identified by the school as being those that will benefit from the input. Those who have attended the pilot sessions are reported to be making better choices and are at a reduced risk of exploitation or getting involved in violence. Click here to find out more.

WHEELS PROJECT

The South Gloucestershire VRP funded the Wheels Project for high-risk young people who were not in full-time education. The project included go-kart Building, go-kart driving and vehicle maintenance courses.

A young person was identified as being at risk of serious violence and CCE, the VRP were able to get them placed onto the Wheels Project. EIT Officers PC Anthony Treadwell and PC Paul Westerlink transported and supported this young person for the duration of the project. Below is an extract from the child's parent.

I would like to say thank you so much for everything you and your team has done for my child. I think without you guy's they wouldn't be the person they are today. To have them picked up from home by the same people all the time (I feel) is very important to them, as this consistency builds up a bond... Without the wheels project I really don't think my child would have turned their life around. Keep up the good work.

DORIS: SOUTH GLOUCESTERSHIRE'S NEW YOUTH BUS HITS THE ROAD

The Knife Angel, a powerful 27-foot sculpture made from over 100,000 surrendered or seized knives, visited North Somerset in May 2024 as part of its nationwide tour to raise awareness of violent crime. Created from contributions by 43 UK police forces, it symbolizes the devastating impact of knife violence.

The sculpture also facilitated community engagement, with schools, youth groups, and organizations coming together through discussions and art projects to emphasize education and early intervention in tackling knife crime.

BEACON OF HOPE: A LASTING LEGACY OF THE KNIFE ANGEL



The community has continued its journey of reflection and unity with the unveiling of the Beacon of Hope sculpture. This inspiring installation serves as a powerful reminder of resilience, creativity, and collective action against violence.

The unveiling was a true celebration, with the community coming together for the 'Walk of Hope', led by the uplifting sounds of local brass band Jump Street. The event was further enriched by a stunning performance from jazz singer Marvin Mouneké and lively entertainment from the talented local circus troupe, Tiny Circus.

The sculpture's design was crafted by pupils from Voyage Learning Campus in collaboration with local artists. Inspired by the Knife Angel's message, this project was delivered by Alliance Homes and North Somerset Council as part of an ongoing initiative to engage young people and promote positive community values.

The Beacon of Hope now stands as a testament to the Knife Angel's legacy, reinforcing the community's commitment to unity, reflection, and a brighter future. It is a shining example of what can be achieved when people come together to inspire change.

This Beacon will provide a lasting legacy and I want to thank everyone involved in this project and the powerful words that adorn it.



The Bristol Violence Reduction Partnership have been visiting parenting groups across the city to formulate relationships and help parents understand what exploitation is, indicators of exploitations and how they can support their children to stay safe.

NEW COMMUNITY GROUP IN SOUTH BRISTOL

The Bristol VRP were invited to share information on supporting children amid growing concerns about youth violence to a new South Bristol group, which has been created to bring together mothers from diverse backgrounds, to focus on shared concerns rather than differences. The session covered topics such as knife crime, child criminal and sexual exploitation, and the importance of open conversations within families and the community.

The group meets every Friday from 10.00am - 12noon at the Hub Oasis Cannaught, BS41NH.

DRINK/DRUG GOGGLE EXPERIENCE

The Quakers Parents Group, funded by Bristol Violence Reduction Partnership, recently held two meetings with the partnership to raise awareness on key issues affecting young people. The first session introduced Safer Options and shared important information on topics like county lines, child sexual exploitation, and knife crime. The Bristol Drugs Project, in collaboration with the Bristol VRP, joined the group of 20 parents to discuss the dangers of drugs.

The session covered common drugs (Class A, B, and C), current drug trends in Bristol, and signs of child exploitation. The group also discussed concerns about parents seeking support without criminalising their children, and the long-term impact this could have on job opportunities. Parents explored how to strengthen their support networks and feel more comfortable reaching out for help when needed.

CITY OF BRISTOL COLLEGE WINTER SAFETY AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

This quarter marked the completion of our "Staying Safe in Winter" awareness campaign with a visit to the final City of Bristol College site. Despite being smaller in size, over 150 individuals



took part in meaningful conversations with professionals about key topics such as exploitation, drug awareness, knife crime, and methods for reporting incidents to the police.

Across all four college sites, more than 400 people engaged in these discussions, and they are now playing an active role in spreading the awareness.

EXPLOITATION AWARENESS TRAINING AT CABOT CIRCUS



Retail staff regularly interact with children and young people within their working role. It is important to be aware of potential safeguarding concerns.

A variety of Cabot Circus businesses attended a partnership Exploitation Awareness Training workshop last year (pictured), which equipped participants with the knowledge and tools to

respond appropriately in such situations. Plans are now underway to deliver a similar workshop to security businesses across the city later this year.
